degree with an emphasis in leadership and public administration from Northern Arizona University and a bachelor's degree in recreation management from Arizona State University. Frisoni will oversee Communications, Parks, Recreation and Library Services, Neighborhood and Human Services, Community and Economic Development, Intergovernmental Programs and Mayor and Council Services. As of July 1, under a new reorganization, Frisoni will oversee Communications, Community Services, Intergovernmental Programs (including Mayor and Council Services) and Economic Development.

For the remainder of the fiscal year, Campbell will manage Water Services, Public Works, Transportation and Technology and Innovation. At the beginning of the fiscal year, she will oversee Public Works, Development Services and Water Services.

Frisoni and Campbell officially begin their new assignments on March 3.

The Glendale Fire Department Promotes National Burn Awareness Week and Scalding Injury Prevention. The Glendale Fire Department is currently promoting National Burn Awareness week, which runs through Feb. 8, 2014, and wants to provide residents with information on scald injury prevention.

Scald injuries occur when hot liquid, hot food or steam damages one or more layers of skin with most burns occurring in the home, usually in the kitchen or bathroom.

Burn injuries affect all ages. Young children and the elderly are the most vulnerable. Over 100,000 children were seen in emergency rooms across the country last year for scalding burn injuries.

Scalds can be prevented through increased awareness of scald hazards and by making simple environmental or behavioral changes. The Glendale Fire Department encourages residents to take these steps to ensure their home is safe and to prevent a scalding injury:

City Of Glendale Announces New Assistant City Managers. Campbell, the current Community Services Director for the city of Maricopa, has 16 years of local government experience, including management experience for the cities of Peoria and Goodyear.

- Set water heater at lowest level. Water temp should never rise above 120°F in residences and 110°F in nursing homes/ day cares.
- Always establish a “kid-safe” zone in the kitchen, keep all children at least 3 feet from any cooking appliance.
- Use the back burners when possible.
- Turn pot/pan handles towards back of stove.
- Avoid using table cloths. Children can use these to pull hot object down on them.
- DO NOT warm baby bottles in the microwave.
- DO NOT hold a child while cooking or carrying a hot beverage.

Jo Miller, co-author of *Earth-Friendly Desert Gardening*, will present “*The Nature of Design*” providing practical tips and techniques for designing or renovating your yard to create a beautiful landscape that is both water and energy efficient. This course will provide instruction on how to assess your specific property, as well as how to draw a conceptual map. Ideas and techniques will also be provided for the homeowner with an existing landscape.

Wednesday, Feb. 12, 6 to 8 p.m.

Brad Lancaster, author of *Rainwater Harvesting for Drylands and Beyond*, will present “*Integrated Local Harvests*” offering simple and effective ways to enhance the abundance of your home and community. Lancaster’s goal is to help others by harvesting and enhancing free on-site resources such as water, sun, wind, shade and more. His books explain what water harvesting is, how to do it appropriately and how to tailor water-harvesting strategies to unique conditions. After the class, Lancaster will be available to sign his books. Lancaster’s presentation is made possible through a partnership with the Watershed Management group and the city of Glendale Conservation and Sustainable Living office.
